Family History - Bob & Linda Fuchslin

Robert Fuchslin is a long time Aelpler Gruppe life member who has been relentlessly dedicated to the success of the Aelpler Gruppe and Newark Swiss Park Bar and Grill and the "Swiss Way" for countless years. Robert's father Martin Fuchslin was born January 21, 1896, to Benedikt and Marie Katharina Fuchslin whom lived in Einsiedeln, Switzerland in Canton Schwyz. Robert's mother Anne Kreienbuhl was born October 12, 1899, to Leonhard and Emilie Kreienbuhl and lived in Waag (Unteriberg), Switzerland in Canton Schwyz.

Martin worked as a butcher and Anne as a waitress in Switzerland.

Looking for more opportunity, Martin, age 24, and Anne, age 21, made the decision to immigrate to the United States. They boarded the Lapland ship with \$50.00 in their pocket and arrived at Ellis Island in 1920. Martin and Anne immediately traveled to San Francisco, California where they married on January 8, 1921. Over the next several years, Martin and Anne opened 4 bars in San Francisco: The Bryant Hotel, Montana Club, The Helvetia and the Swiss Club. During Prohibition, Martin would travel to Sonoma, California to get his "supplies" from fellow Swiss! Interesting fact: Martin Fuchslin gave a job to Cari Schuler as a bartender when Cari arrived from Switzerland. Cari later became a manager of the Newark Swiss Park!

Martin and Anne had three children: Anne, Joey and Robert. Unfortunately, Joey passed at the early age of 10 years old. Robert was born on February 17, 1938, and grew up in San Francisco attending St. Ignatius High School and graduating from Santa Clara University in 1960. Martin and Anne ultimately moved the family to Fremont, California where Robert spent many days and nights at the Newark Swiss Park with his immediate and extended family including Joe Fuchslin who managed the Swiss Park Bar for many of these years with his partner Carl Riechmuth. It was during this time that Robert's love and commitment to the Swiss Park Bar was developed.

Robert joined the Military Reserve in 1962 during the Berlin Crisis stationed at Fort Bragg. After two years and an honorable discharge, Robert worked at several well-known companies such as Crocker Bank, Chevron, Diamond International and Moore Business Forms in addition to owning his own printing and appraisal businesses.

Robert met his wife Linda Truttman in San Francisco where they both lived in the same apartment complex as neighbors.



One night Robert locked himself out of his apartment during a party. Robert knocked on Linda's door holding a martini pitcher and asked if he could crawl over her balcony to his apartment. The rest is history! It was not easy to find a nice Swiss girl in San Francisco in those days and he had one living right next door. Interestingly, as Robert would later find out, Robert's father Martin knew Linda's Uncle Frank Truttman and would go hunting together many times well before Robert and Linda met.

Linda Truttman's family had migrated from Steinerberg, Switzerland in Canton Schwyz and her parents, Louis and Frances Truttman had settled in Yreka, California running a dairy and then a cattle ranch. Robert and Linda married April 4, 1964, and resided in Sacramento, California and shortly thereafter moved to Fremont, California.

Robert and Linda raised three children in Fremont, California: Suzanne, Lisa and Danny. And as you would expect, all three children grew up at the Newark Swiss Park attending Swiss events and dances and joining the Aelpler Gruppe. Robert and Linda ensured that their children knew their Swiss roots, culture and traditions. Robert has stayed close to his relatives in Switzerland, taking the family to visit often and ensuring generational bonds that exist even today.

Robert's passion for his Swiss heritage, his memories of the Newark Swiss Park growing up and raising his children led him to taking on the role as the Newark Swiss Park manager. Robert has held this role for 15 years and his goal has always been to carry on the Aelpler Gruppe and Newark Swiss Park traditions.

As most know, keeping the Newark Swiss Park Bar and Grille a viable entity is not always an easy task. Robert took on the challenge bringing new ideas to the table and with the support of the Swiss Park Board, has significantly increased the popularity of the Swiss Park with both the Swiss and non-Swiss. Some of the new ideas Robert brought to ensure Swiss Park viability are: large outdoor multi-cultural events/concerts, comedy nights, drive-in movies, class reunions, local club events, indoor concerts and dances, Google parking lot rental, etc. etc.

Robert dedicated himself to making new contacts, meeting event planners all over the Bay Area to bring these revenue generating opportunities to the Newark Swiss Park. The investments back into the Swiss Park given the success have been invaluable. In parallel, Robert ensured that the Aelpler Gruppe and other local Swiss groups needs were met and prioritized.

While Robert has been employed by the Newark Swiss Park as the manager for many years, all know that Robert goes above and beyond this role and has volunteered an enormous amount of his time each day to keeping the Swiss Park functioning.

Seeing Robert's passion for the Aelpler Gruppe and the Newark Swiss Park and following his lead, all three of Robert's children and his wife have volunteered with Linda sewing curtains, Suzanne working events, sitting on the Aelpler Gruppe Board, accompanying Robert on new revenue reviews, Lisa developing marketing material, working events and Danny working events and assisting Robert and family to build the Schwingen Hütte.

Robert and Linda have three grandchildren, Doug, Catherine and Alexandra. You guessed it: all grew up attending and volunteering at Aelpler Gruppe and Newark Swiss Park events. The traditions of the Aelpler Gruppe and Newark Swiss Park live on not only for the Fuchslin's, but for all local Swiss thanks to Robert's relentless dedication.





Support for Fred Denier



Farming God's country was in Fred Denier's blood since he was a young man, but God had a change of plans for Fred on June 2, 2023. He was suddenly struck down by a massive heart attack while in his home. After quite some time of CPR, Fred finally had a heartbeat. The extended period resulted in a traumatic brain injury (TBI), that left him completely incapacitated and in a coma. Since that day, he has resided in ICU, Subacute and intermediate rehabilitation facilities, more recently resides in a long-term skilled nursing facility for ongoing care. During this time his ventilator was removed, and a tracheotomy was installed to aid him with breathing on his own.

As of March 2025, it has been 21 months since Fred's heart attack and TBI. He is still fully incapacitated and minimally conscience, unable to speak or respond to requests and still has a tracheotomy and a feeding tube. He slowly continued to make some progress, but his improvement stalled. He receives weekly stretching treatments to reduce contractures in his extremities

and a holistic concentrated vitamin program to improve and stabilize his overall health. The next step is to administer alternative stem cell therapy as a

regenerative treatment program in hopes of repairing damage to his body and brain. The alternative vitamin and stem cell therapy is very expensive and not covered by insurance.

Fred Denier is 65 years old and prior to the heart attack, was a hard-working dairyman in business over 40 years. Fred loved his work; however, cows produce milk 7 days a week and hence a dairy man's job is never

done. He loved to be with his herd, so he rarely took time off for relaxation. His job brought him great pride and satisfaction.



Fred was the sole source of income for his family of four. This trauma has left his wife Cathy

and two sons with a very unknown future, both financially and medically. They are faced with a large amount of medical expenses and an unknown future income. Not only is Fred not able to attend to his beloved herd of cows, but the dairy industry has fallen into hard times during the last few years.

Fred is not only a loving husband, father, son and brother; but a great friend to all who know him in the local community. He was involved in many agricultural and dairy associations, providing leadership on advisory boards. Fred generously volunteered 15 years to the Boy Scouts of America, as a cubmaster and scoutmaster along with his wife and two sons.

Our hope is that the Denier's family, friends, community and even strangers will help to ease the heavy

financial burden of current and future medical expenses. Your donations can make a significant difference in ensuring that Fred receives the care he needs, as he continues to fight to hopefully reclaim his life.

Obituaries



Lois Madeline Ulrich November 7, 1938 - February 13, 2025

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of our lifetime member Lois Madeline Ulrich who passed away on February 13, 2025 after the onset of a sudden illness at the age of 86.

Lois was born to the late Albin & Elsa Fassler while they were living in Nicolaus, California. At age 4, the family moved to Sloughhouse, California where she grew up helping her family run their 400-acre ranch, raising beef cattle and growing alfalfa hay. In Sloughhouse she began her education at Rhoads School, a one-room schoolhouse which now resides in Elk Grove Park as a living history museum. While attending Elk Grove High School, she began playing Swiss music with her older brother Leo Fassler and Ronnie Scheiber. She said that playing Swiss music opened up new opportunities, for which she was truly grateful.

After graduating high school, Lois worked for the State Division of Highways in Sacramento. She saved enough money to buy her own piano and pay for a 10-week trip to Europe with her friend Toni/Antoinette Betschart. The trip was one of her fondest memories and reached a high point in Switzerland when one of her favorite ensembles, Kapelle Heirassa, invited her up on stage to play piano with them.

On her 25th birthday, Lois moved from Sloughhouse to San Jose when she was hired to work at IBM as a secretary. It was during this time that she joined Shorty Imhof's Orchestra where she played piano next to an accordion player named Walter Ulrich. They began getting acquainted and started dating. Lois married Walter Ulrich in 1967, and they settled into their Fremont home which was originally part of the Wipfli family dairy. Lois and Walt began their family in 1969 when they welcomed Monica, followed a year later by Sonia.

Lois was a loving wife and mother who always said she cooked "with butter and love." Her family was her greatest treasure. Her hobbies included gardening, home decorating, and reading, but she also enjoyed her annual "Motorhome" trips with her dear friends as well as hosting visitors from around the world. She and Walt would organize dinners in their home for a house full of party guests after Newark Schwingfests ended and before the evening dances began. Oftentimes many friends returned to the house for breakfast in the early hours of the morning once the dance had finished and the bar closed.

Lois went back to work as a secretary at Ohlone College's Department of Fine and Performing Arts in the late 1980's. The department embodied everything she enjoyed... art, music and theater. She continued at Ohlone until the year 2000 when her first grandchild was born. Lois happily made herself available to babysit her beloved grandchildren, although she and Walt also greatly enjoyed traveling when the opportunity arose. She was always involved in events hosted by the Aelpler Gruppe and San Joaquin Valley Swiss clubs and was fond of visiting other Swiss clubs up and down the west coast as well as those in Wisconsin, New Zealand and South Africa while on trips with the Jolly Swiss. Her Swiss heritage meant so much to her, and she was delighted that her family, especially her grandchildren, appreciated their cultural connection too. Lois will be greatly missed. She had an infectious laugh, was a gracious hostess and made the perfect audience. She was always up for a game, good time, or adventure. Lois was preceded in death by her husband Walter Ulrich (2019). She is survived by her brother, Leo Fassler, daughter Monica (Bret Watson), daughter Sonia (Monica Kenyon), grandchildren Camille, Lydia, and Grant Watson and Kenyon Ertefai as well as many nieces and nephews.

They had two beautiful daughters; Michelle (who sadly passed away in her childhood) and Julia.

Karen always believed that true friends are there, even if they don't talk daily. Karen will be greatly missed.

Record-breaking winter for Swiss tourism driven by foreign visitors - Swiss tourism has enjoyed a successful winter season, thanks to excellent snow conditions and an influx of foreign visitors. This is according to a survey by Switzerland Tourism, reflecting on the 2024/25 winter period.

Feedback from tourism marketers, holiday resorts, regional authorities, mountain railways and the hotel industry suggests that this winter has outdone last season's record. Switzerland Tourism announced on Tuesday that this is largely thanks to foreign visitors.

Fewer guests from Switzerland

Accommodation providers are anticipating a 2% increase in overnight stays this season, according to the survey. Day trips are also expected to rise by 3% compared to last winter.

Just like in the summer, the surge in visitors from the United States is notable. "The US market is also increasingly strong in winter," says Martin Vincenz, CEO of Graubünden Ferien, speaking for the entire industry. However, many places also saw a significant number of guests from Europe.

The domestic market, however, wasn't a significant factor this winter season. Many areas saw a noticeable drop in Swiss visitors compared to last year.

Many Swiss ski resorts still open until Easter. The weather played a key role this season. "Grey at the bottom – blue at the top" was a common theme in weather reports for many days and weeks. Early and abundant snowfall also ensured a strong start to the season and excellent conditions, according to Switzerland Tourism.

While spring has arrived in the valleys, winter is still going strong in the mountains. According to the survey, 58% of mountain railways are keeping their winter sports operations running through Easter, with 12% extending even further. Only 30% have ended their winter season. (swissinfo.ch)
